We maintained financial stability and transparency. Our commitment to responsible resource management ensures that every dollar is used effectively to achieve our goals.

The organisation was established in 2008 and is registered with the government of Malawi under the Trustee Incorporation Act (Certificate TR/INC 4822). LICO is also registered with the Council of Non-Governmental Organisations in Malawi and the NGO Regulatory Authority.
- The organisation's current strategic plan runs from 2022 to 2025. To implement its strategic plan, LICO collaborates with district-level government stakeholders and CSOs. At the community level, we engage and collaborate with the community systems and structures in order to deliver results that are relevant and sustainable.

PERFORMANCE OVERVIEW

In 2023, we implemented quite a number of interventions in health, education, child protection, women empowerment and sports. With our interventions, we reached a total of 19,280 people in 2023 as compared to 11,700 people reached in 2022, representing 65% increase in people reached. Education interventions had the highest reach at 41% seconded by child protection at 25%. Health interventions contributed 18.6% of the total reach while women empowerment, mental health and sports reached 15.4%. We implemented the following interventions in 2023:



- HIV/AIDS Prevention Service, Testing and, Treatment.
- Sexual and Reproductive Health Rights services.
- Nutritional support.
- Menstrual Hygiene Management.

IP. EDUCATION

Educations is one of the LICO's key programmatic pillars in which we seek to increase access to quality education among children and young people from rural and vulnerable communities.

According to UNESCO, Malawi has a total of 4.5m pupils enrolled in primary and secondary education. Of these pupils, about 3.7m (83%) are enrolled in primary education. In Malawi, 11% of children who are of official primary school ages are out of school, with poorer children most likely to fall into this category. Among others, issues like unconducive learning environment and lack of school fees are the leading causes to low school enrolment and increased dropouts. To address the identified gaps, we implemented the following interventions in 2023:

- We supported 11 government primary schools with a total 468 classroom desks, 32 schools with study solar lamps and learning materials, directly serving over 4,300 learners.
- We supported construction of a school classroom block at Mayembe Primary School, directly serving 120 students.
- We provided bursary scholarships to 45 needy students, and school uniforms to 320 students.
- We trained 360 out of school young people (Boys 190 and Girls 170) in digital literacy and computer skills and linked them to employment and business opportunities.
- We supported Mhuju, Bumba and Bolero Primary Schools' libraries to ensure that students fully utilize the library services, through provision of library books, capacity development in library management and construction of the library infrastructure, directly serving 2,800 students.





WCHILD PROTECTION

Preventing violence against children is one of our key thematic areas. We seek to reduce incidences of violence against children through increased awareness, promotion of rights, and apprehending perpetrators.

Sexual violence against children knows no boundaries and occurs across all parts of society. It can take the form of sexual harassment, sexual abuse and exploitation. NO CHILD should experience this horrific brutality. Yet, children in Malawi experience high rates of violence with one in five girls and one in seven boys experiencing sexual violence. Most children who are sexually abused in Malawi experience it on multiple occasions. To address these horrific acts, LICO implemented the following interventions in 2023:

- Establishment of He for She Clubs in 3 Primary schools and trained a total of 120 learners as champions in ending GBV prevention. The trained champions reached out to 3,600 fellow learners.
- Intensified awareness raising in schools and communities using education toys, and radio programs and collaborating with law enforcement agents to implement mobile court hearings and judgements right in the communities.
- We worked with community-based structures such as women forums and child protection committees to build their capacity on their roles with regard to prevention and management of child abuse cases. 13 women forums and 10 child protection committees were trained.
- We worked with children with disabilities on self defense mechanisms and assisted with walking aids and other social needs.







Women report greater barriers to healthcare and adhere to more traditional gender roles than men in Malawi. In 2023, through our interventions in health, we reached a total of 3,586 people, representing 18.6% of the overall total number of people reached by our interventions. LICO is implementing health interventions in Rumphi district targeting adolescent girls and young people, women of reproductive health, female sex workers and people living with HIV.

- LICO championed the male involvement in elimination of Mother to Child Transmition of new HIV
 infections (eMTCT) at Mwazisi Health Centre, reaching to a total of 2,101 couples, adolescents, and HIVexposed infants with HIV testing, treatment and awareness services. 16 cases of lost follow-ups were
 linked back to care and treatment through a health facility-based teen club.
- LICO established 30 community-based study circle groups which act as HIV community information hubs for men and women of reproductive age groups. Through this approach, male involvement in health services increased to 95.0% while home deliveries decreased to 0.4%.
- 20 girls' peer leaders and 20 female sex workers were trained in peer leadership, life skills and HIV/AIDS management. The trained peer leaders acted as community gatekeepers ensuring that HIV/AIDS and SRHR information services are disseminated. Through the trained peer leaders, 485 young people were linked to the health facility to access youth-friendly sexual and reproductive health services.
- A total of 85 women and adolescents living with HIV were linked to nutritional care and support.
- Through the menstrual health interventions, 915 girls received reusable sanitary pads and menstrual health education.





WOMEN EMPOWERMENT

Gender-based violence (GBV) remains a serious development challenge in Malawi. Women and girls in Malawi fare worse than their male counterparts on socio-economic indicators including secondary and tertiary education enrolment and completion, wage equality, political participation, and literacy.

Under women's economic empowerment, LICO seek to empower vulnerable groups of women, economically, through support in livelihood and agriculture activities. In 2023, we worked with vulnerable groups of women to achieve the following:

- We supported 43 women groups, with farm inputs to pursue agricultural activities. The groups grew varieties of farm crops and livestock production. From the crop farming activities, the groups realized \$15.3K while livestock production generated \$23.9K at the end of the year. This is a big milestone for women groups as some were able to build houses and others paid school fees for their children. 380 women championed the interventions.
- We built the capacity of 960 women in financial literacy, digital marketing and cyber security.





RESEARCH & MENTAL HEALTH

Gender-based violence and mental health issues are often hidden behind the face of the physical devastation that is occurring as a result of climate change. Recently, Cyclones caused extensive devastation in Malawi where the flooding has resulted in hundreds of lives lost and extensive displacement. Once displaced from their homes by such climate extremes - women and girls are particularly vulnerable to sexual exploitation and gender-based violence: significantly limiting their life opportunities. This not only violates human rights but also impedes development gains, as it undermines physical and mental health, prevents women from assuming leadership and decision-making roles, and impacts the economy through increased health expenditure and reduced productivity. Overall, this threatens the achievement of sustainable development.

In view of the above, LICO partnered with the Glasgow Caledonian University, Mzuzu University and University of Rwanda to conduct research titled "A Determination of the Inter-relationship between Gender-Based Violence, Mental Health and Climate Justice for Progressive Social Change in Malawi" targeting disaster affected districts such as Rumphi, Blantyre and karonga

The research study also provided supportive psychosocial mental health counselling to women who were recovering from the disaster shocks. The project also provided relief basic necessities to the affected women headed households.

A total of 868 women were reached by the project interventions.





SPORTS

LICO uses sports as a tool to raise awareness and disseminate information about Gender-Based Violence, Sexual and Reproductive Health Rights, HIV Prevention and treatment and Physical well-being. LICO also uses sports as an opportunity to expose young talents who may be willing to advance their careers in various sports disciplines.


In 2023, we supported 32 schools and 8 youth clubs with sports equipment. We also supported 4 sports bonanzas.

Our interventions reached 828 people directly.





- In 2023, there is a significant progress across our various interventions, each contributing positively to the overall well-being of the lives of individuals in the targeted communities.
- In health, there is a significant reduction in the incidences of home deliveries, especially targeting couples
 on ART medication, recording only 0.4% in 2023. This was achieved through intensified awareness-raising
 and meaningful community participation. It is a big milestone in line with the global goal towards achieving
 zero new HIV infections.
- In education, there is a significant turnaround in terms of school dropouts and academic performance. Of
 the schools supported by our interventions, 3 emerged the best and were amongst the top best
 performing schools in Malawi during 2023 Primary School National Examinations. Enrollment in the
 supported schools improved by 96%.
- In Child Protection, LICO's Education using Toys, an approach to raising awareness about child sexual
 abuse prevention, is regarded as a role model approach and has been invited for presentations at various
 national conferences as a best practice. Rumphi was once one of the districts with high prevalence of child
 sexual abuse cases. In 2023, we witnessed significant drop in new cases of child sexual abuse in both,
 schools and communities, by 85%.






INSTITUTIONAL CAPACITY STRENGTHENING & CREDIBILITY

- In 2023, LICO worked with **Norwegian Agency for Exchange Cooperation (Norec)**, which is an executive body under the Norwegian Ministry of Foreign Affairs, in a program that supports global partnerships for sustainable development. Through collaborative work exchanges and the sharing of competence and expertise, Norec helps young professionals develop international expertise in sustainable development.
- Through the program, LICO boasts of a dynamic team of youthful staff members dedicated to enhancing the organization's performance. Presently, we are implementing a collaborative program with Primrose Community Health Organization (PriCHO) from Zambia, focused on facilitating an exchange program. Our aim is to amplify impactful outcomes and cultivate growth opportunities through leveraging the NOREC platform to strengthen capacities and foster robust collaborations. Through the NOREC program, we aim to enhance the productivity and efficiency of our staff by providing training and readiness for international exchange initiatives. These endeavors are tailored to instill participants with intercultural sensitivity, appreciation for diversity, integrity, inclusivity and collaboration, thereby enriching their professional development capacities.
- In 2023, LICO received **the presidential award** as one of the best performing local NGOs in Malawi, in the category of financial prudence, statutory compliance and projects impact. The award provides a special milestone in the organization's history, having achieved similar milestones in 2014 when the organization received a prestigious global UNAIDS award in our role in contributing towards prevention of mother to child transmission of HIV.





Our financial year runs from January to December. In comparison with the 2022 financial year, our annual revenue grew by 14% in 2023. This was the first reported positive growth post-Covid-19 recovery period. The 2023 financial year saw more clients served as compared to 2022. This was due to programming innovations and strategy realignments to ensure that our work was beneficiary centred and that we maintained donor trust. The approaches led to 96% beneficiary satisfaction and were hailed by stakeholders, partners and the regulatory authorities. This led to LICO being recognised as the most transparent. complying, prudent and impactful local organisation in Malawi in 2023 by NGO Regulatory Authority.




- Food Security. Malawi is yet to recover from the shocks of climate change. Over 50% of the population is at risk of facing famine. Malawi has declared state of disaster in the 23 out of 28 districts.
- Skills Development. The increased unemployment for young people is a catalyst for the
 worsening poverty levels. We would like to empower young people with vocational skills for
 self employment





CHALLENGES


- **Food insecurity** Malawi is facing acute shortage of staple food, and our beneficiaries have not been spared.
- Mobility In 2023, we only had one vehicle and two in-condition motorbikes for the
 implementation of all the project activities. The availability of reliable transport is a catalyst for
 the smooth delivery of projects.
- **Inflation** Due to the devaluation of Malawi's local currency, the prices of goods and services are not stable. This has a direct effect on our budgets. In 2023, the economic environment was not conducive for LICO.
